

Shake the Jingle Bells—This game is a fantastic way to add some excitement. To play, create two holes in the sides of a tissue box, allowing your belt or string to go around your waist. Then, fill the opening with jingle bells. Set a timer, and watch the family race to shake out all the bells in 60 seconds. Supplies needed: Large jingle bells, Tissue box. Strong string or thin belt (or something else to tie the box to the waist)

Wrap the Christmas Tree—Get ready for a wild and wacky game that everyone will absolutely love! The idea is simple—select one family member to be the "Christmas tree" and see how quickly they can decorate themselves with garland. But here's the fun part: use Christmas stickers as ornaments and top it off with a star. Supplies: Garland/tinsel, Ribbon, Christmas Stickers, Star





Snowman Shooters—This winter STEM activity will be enjoyed by all. Carefully cut off the bottom of a paper cup. Tie the balloon an cut the bottom off. Stretch it over the cup to make the snowman's hat. Create a face on the cup and let the fun begin using marshmallows or cotton wool when you pull back the snowman's hat

Christmas Obstacle Course—This easy Christmas game will provide tons of indoor obstacle fun. Just tape the garland to walls or tie between chairs, add in other skills such as crawling through or over objects too. Create a challenge where you have to navigate through it without touching or knocking into it such as crawling through a hoop without jingling the bells. You'll be amazed at how much fun it is for the whole family – the perfect game with a Christmas twist! Supplies needed: Garland, tinsel, or ribbon, tape, bells, boxes, tunnels, hoops.





We have been very busy getting ready for Christmas. The children loved getting involved with decorating our Christmas tree and it has made our classroom feel very festive. There has been lots of glitter as the children made gifts to take home with them all completing the tasks individually and being able to use their own creative flare. Every child dressed up as

Bethlem stars in the Nativity joined up with the School. After practicing the songs for the past few weeks, they sung with full voice in front of 2 big audiences. On our last week before Christmas, we have lots to look forward to—a Christmas disco with Disco Dion, dress up as an elf day, snow, presents and a Christmas dinner.





Ingredients; 200g Caster sugar, 175gplain flour: 175g/60Z plain flour, 50g Cocoa powder, 1½ tsp baking powder, ½ tsp biCarbonate of soda, pinch salt, 100ml sunflower oil, 2 large free-range eggs, 2 tbsp soured Cream, 125ml boiling water, 200g unsalted butter, 400g icing sugar, 1–2 tbsp milk, 100g white ready-to-roll fondant icing, orange food Colouring paste, red food Colouring paste, 12 white marshmallows, black writing icing tube, 2 tsp desicCated Coconut, 12 pretzel sticks, broken in half Method; Preheat oven to 170C/160C Fan/Gas 3½ and line muffin tin with paper cupcake cases. Sift sugar, flour, Cocoa, baking powder, biCarbonate of soda and salt into a large bowl. Stir in sunflower oil, eggs and soured Cream until smooth. Add boiling water and beat again until silky smooth. Pour evenly between the paper cupcake cases. Bake for 20–22 minutes until well risen. Leave to cool for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. To make the buttercream, beat the butter until pale and light, then gradually stir in icing sugar and milk until smooth. Make the snowman noses with 25g of the fondant icing. Add dots of orange food colouring paste using a wooden skewer and knead until completely orange. Roll into 12 carrot shapes about 1cm long. Leave to dry. Tint the remaining icing red using the food colouring paste. Dust work surface with icing sugar and roll into a rectangle. Slice into 12 strips to make the scarves. Use the black writing icing to draw eyes and a mouth onto each marshmallow and stick an the Carrot. Spread buttercream on top of each cake and add marshmallow. Scatter desiccated coconut and push two pretzels in sides. Wrap the scarf around the neck of each marshmallow.

Ingredients; 50g light muscovado sugar, 50g dark muscovado sugar, 50g golden syrup, 150g butter, roughly Chopped, 1 medium free-range egg, 300g plain flour, 1 thsp ground ginger, 1 thsp ground mixed spice:, 50g coloured hard boiled sweets, 20 strawberry laces, 15g dark/milk chocolate chopped, 10 mini peanut butter cups. Method; Put all sugar, golden syrup and butter in a saucepan. Set it over a medium heat and warm, stirring occasionally, until butter has melted and sugars have dissolved. Transfer to a large bowl and leave to cool for about 5 minutes before beating in egg. Sift over flour and then spices, mixing gently after each addition, to make a soft dough. Wrap dough in cling film and chill for several hours, preferably overnight. Remove dough from fridge 15-30 minutes before rolling. Split dough in half and roll out each piece between two sheets of baking parchment to the thickness of a £1 coin. (Ising a Variety of round Cutters, cut out discs. (Ise the end of a thin paintbrush handle, straw or cocktail stick to make a hole near the top. Make sure there is space between the baubles, then lift them (on their sheets of parchment), on to baking trays and refrigerate for 15 minutes. Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4 while the biscuits are chilling. Meanwhile, crush the boiled sweets into small pieces. Remove the baubles from the fridge and use the star cutter to stamp out from the centre of each. Carefully remove stars and put on separate baking tray. Carefully put the crushed-up sweets inside the cut-out star shapes. Bake biscuits for 8-12 minutes or until the sweets have melted and the biscuits are deep golden-brown. Bake cut-out stars separately for about 5 minutes. Leave the biscuits to firm up on their trays until the melted sweets have set before transferring, on the parchment, to a wire rack to cool. Thread a strawperry lace through the hole in each bauble. Melt the chocolate in a microwave, dab a small amount on top of the biscuit and stick on peanut cup.





Pom-pom pine cone Christmas tree decorations

You will need: fir cones, PVA glue, paintbrush, mini pom-poms, natural string. Use your paintbrush to add dabs of glue to your pine cone where you want the pom-poms to be. Once your glue is in position, add your mini pom-poms. Push each one gently into the glue, to give it a good chance of sticking. The shape of the pine cone should help to hold them in. Once the glue has dried, cut a length of string and tie it around the top of each pine cone. Aim to have the top of the pine cone in the middle of the length of string. Then tie both ends together to make a large loop.

Saltdough Christmas spice ornaments

You will need: 1 cup salt, 2 cups flour, 1 cup room temperature water, spices of your choice. Put all ingredients in a bowl and thread together until you have made a dough. Roll it out until roughly 1 cm thick. Using a round cookie cutter, cut out the shapes and using the end of a paintbrush, push a hole in the top to enable you to hang the decoration.

Decorate your ornament with spices.

Leave to dry. It will take about 3 days for your ornament to fully dry. After a day flip it over so it can also dry the underside. Once it is dry, add the string or twine and hang it onto the tree!



Stick star ornaments

You will need: Sticks of varying sizes, natural twine, ribbon, wooden beads. Use 5 fairly equal in length sticks. Fashion them in the shape of a star and glue edges together. Regular glue works ok, but has a longer dry time. Hot glue works best. Once dry wrap string, twine, or ribbon around the star. Wrap just the points of the star, wrap the individual twigs or wrap the whole thing. A fun variation would be to make tassels and attach them to the end of the points. If you don't have string or ribbon just paint that star or cover it in glitter (if you're brave). You could also paint the sticks/twine or add sequins to make them more colourful.





Printed tree Christmas cards

You will need: Large conifer branch, paper or card, paintbrush or sponge, green paint, PVA glue, decorations of your choosing. Once you have found your selected branch, cover one side of it with the paint by either brushing or sponging it on. Turn it over and squash it onto your chosen paper or card. Carefully peel it back and leave it to dry fully. Once dried, use sequins, wooden stars or whatever you and your child have selected to use. Dab the glue over the dried paint and spread it across the page to where you want the decorations to be.. There gorgeous trees can be made into Christmas cards or framed and given as presents for family and friends.
